Financial Tips for Alzheimer's Caregivers

If you are, or will be, a caregiver for elderly parents or another close family member living with Alzheimer's disease, you may experience some emotional stress – but you also need to be aware of the financial issues involved and what actions you can take to help address them.

You will find few “off the rack” solutions for dealing with the financial challenges associated with Alzheimer's.

For one thing, family situations can vary greatly, both in terms of the financial resources available and in the availability and capabilities of potential caregivers. Furthermore, depending on the stage of the disease, people living with Alzheimer's may have a range of cognitive abilities, which will affect the level of care needed.

Here are some general suggestions that may be useful to you in your role as caregiver:

*Consult with family members and close friends.* It's extremely hard to be a solo caregiver. By consulting with other family members or close friends, you may find that some of them have the time and ability to help.

*Consider obtaining durable power of attorney.* If you possess a durable power of attorney for finances, you can make financial decisions for the person with Alzheimer's when he or she is no longer able.

With this authority, you can help the individual living with the disease – and your entire family – avoid court actions that can take away control of financial affairs. And on a short-term basis, having durable power of attorney can help you take additional steps if needed.

You'll find it much easier to acquire durable power of attorney when the individual living with Alzheimer's is still in the early stage of the disease and can willingly and knowingly grant you this authority.

*Gather all necessary documents.* You'll be in a better position to help the individual living with Alzheimer's if you have all the important financial documents – bank statements, insurance policies, wills, Social Security pay-

ment information, deeds, etc. – in one place.

*Get professional help.* You may want to consult with an attorney, who can advise you on establishing appropriate arrangements, such as a living trust, which provides instructions about the estate of the person for whom you're providing care and names a trustee to hold title to property and funds for the beneficiaries.

You also might want to meet with a financial advisor, who can help identify potential resources and money-saving services. And a tax professional may be able to help you find tax deductions connected to your role as caregiver.

Finally, use your experience as a caregiver to remind yourself

of the importance of planning for your own needs.

For example, a financial professional can suggest ways of preparing for the potentially huge costs of long-term care, such as those arising from an extended stay in a nursing home.

Caring for an individual living with Alzheimer's has its challenges. But by taking the appropriate steps, you can reduce uncertainties – and possibly give yourself and your family members a greater sense of security and control.

## Recipes, Etc.

This terrific chicken florentine recipe lies on a bed of spinach leaves and mushrooms and is topped with a creamy white/chicken broth sauce.

### Chicken Florentine

4 skinless chicken breasts  
S&P  
½ cup plus 2 - 3 T of flour  
4 - 5 T. butter  
1 tsp of minced garlic or garlic salt  
½ onion chopped  
1 T. lemon juice  
1 T. Italian seasoning  
1 cup of half/half  
½ cup Parmesan cheese - grated  
1 can of chicken broth  
1 frozen box of spinach (thawed) or 2 cans of spinach (drained)  
1 can of mushrooms (drained) or 4 oz fresh mushrooms  
2/3 cup of bacon bits  
2 cups of mozzarella cheese

Sprinkle chicken with S&P and dredge in flour (½ cup flour). In large skillet over medium heat, melt 2 T. butter, sauté onion and garlic and add chicken breasts and cook til brown (about 5 minutes on each side). Place on plate and cover with foil. (If you find that the breasts are not fully cooked, place in a 350 degree F. oven for about 20 minutes.) Otherwise, leave covered on dish.

Melt 2 T. of butter in same skillet

over medium heat (do not clean skillet - but use the drippings as well), using a wooden spoon while stirring and scraping. Make a roux out of the chicken broth, half and half, whisking with flour (2-3 T.) and add the Parmesan cheese, lemon juice and mix until thickened.

In a 9 x 9 casserole dish, place drained spinach and top with mushrooms, pour 1/2 of the cream sauce over the mushrooms, add the chicken pieces and the remainder of the cream sauce, bacon bits and top with the mozzarella cheese. Bake in 400 degree F oven for 20 minutes.

*Etc.* — Judge for yourself when making the roux, if you need more thickener, do so by adding more flour - but be sure to mix with liquid such as your cream or broth before adding to the roux.

You can also skip flouring the chicken and simply place your chicken on a baking dish in a 350 degree oven for 20-25 minutes and continue and then continue with the above process.

*Etc. Etc.* — In regard to the NC Gazette (August 10 issue) of the Almond Kringler, the crust layer is similar to a pie crust - combine ½ cup softened butter with 1 cup of flour and mix with a pastry cutter and add 2 T. cold water until dough comes together. Follow the recipe and continue the process.

Some of our readers asked for the crust ingredients. Hope this will help.

# Is Brick and Mortar Retail Dead?

*To support current and future New Carlisle businesses, local organizations are hosting a free Creating Small Business Success workshop on September 13. The Gazette is presenting a series of articles leading up to the workshop to spark your entrepreneurial ambition.*

The retail market has been greatly disrupted in recent years and bankruptcies of once powerful chains spiked in 2017. Well-known brands including Toys R Us, Payless Shoes and Radio Shack were among 21 major retailers declaring bankruptcy in 2017, a number higher than at the onset of the great recession.

The rise of Amazon is frequently cited as a prime factor in the remaking of the retail landscape, and that company's ascendance exhibits two major trends. First, the migration of sales to online sellers. Second, increasing consolidation as larger retailers purchase smaller companies. Amazon recently acquired PillPack, an online pharmacy, sending shock waves throughout the pharmacy industry and causing the stocks of CVS, Rite Aid and Walgreen to lose \$11 billion in value on the day the acquisition was announced.

The disruptive transformation of the retail environment will likely continue. Many analysts believe the United States is the most "overretailed" market on the planet, having twice as much retail space

per capita than runner up Australia and five times as much as the countries making up the European Union. Ongoing change seems inevitable.

In consideration of the shifts already witnessed it would be easy to write the obituary of retail as we have known it. Yet there is encouraging evidence of a retail renaissance led by independent stores willing to challenge the traditional vision and embrace new ways of doing business. What can we learn from those who are thriving amidst disruption?

First, it is vital to compete on dimensions other than price and selection. Online retailers have an inherent cost advantage by eliminating some of the overhead associated with brick and mortar storefronts, plus online shopping makes it easy for consumers to compare prices over a broad range of sellers.

Online marketplaces such as Amazon also enable consumers to access a vast array of choices. Many shoppers find too much choice to be daunting, however, so storefront retailers offering a carefully curated selection tailored to the desires of a specifically defined target audience can cultivate an advantage.

A second best practice, and a blueprint for avoiding price competition, is offering products that are unique or difficult to find. This might mean selling the products of startup companies or focusing on locally sourced products, which are appealing to younger and more socially conscious consumers.

A third way traditional retailers can differentiate is by offering outstanding personalized service and creating unique environments and experiences for shoppers. This might be accomplished through unique décor and lighting or by bringing service offerings into the store, such as coffee bars that provide a place to gather and linger.

Retail remains in a state of flux and challenges abound, yet opportunities exist for storefront retailers to thrive in the age of Amazon. Brick and mortar is definitely not dead.

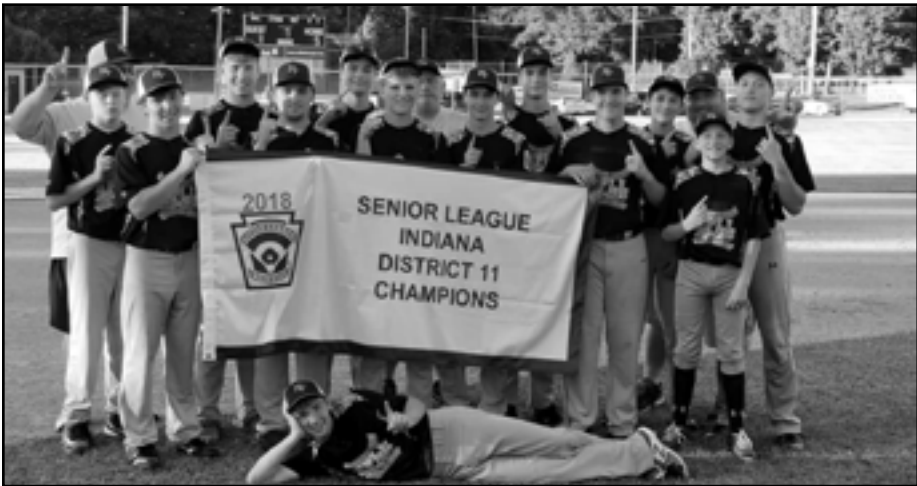
