4 skinless chicken breasts

½ cup plus 2 - 3 T of flour

4 - 5 T. butter

½ onion chopped

1 T. lemon juice

1 T. Italian seasoning

1 cup of half/half

½ cup Parmesan cheese - grated

1 can of chicken broth

1 frozen box of spinach (thawed) or before adding to the roux.






