Although the project officially broke ground last November, construction on the new St. Joseph Energy Center has become much more noticeable over the past several weeks.

Julie Nixon Eisenhower's New York. **Chicken Divan**

- 4 de-boned chicken breasts, cooked 1 tsp lemon juice
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 10 oz packages frozen broccoli (cooked)
- ½ cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 tsp curry powder (optional)
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs tossed with 2 T. melted margarine
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup parsley rice
- 1. Combine soup, mayo, lemon juice and curry powder and set aside.
- 2. Spread broccoli in buttered casserole dish (13x9 inch)
- 3. Place chicken breasts on top of broccoli.
- 4. Pour soup mixture on chicken.
- 5. Sprinkle shredded cheddar cheese on top of soup mixture.
- 6. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.
- 7. Serve over bed of rice.

Parsley Rice - 1 1/2 cup uncooked regular rice; 3 T. chicken bouillon cubes; 3 cups water; 3 T. butter; 1/2 c. chopped fresh parsley. Combine rice, bouillon and water in medium sauce-

Bring to a boil, cover and reduce heat; Simmer 20 minutes or until tender; drain. Combine rice, melted margarine with parsley.




