

With June upon us, warm weather, school is out, let's begin to party... here are a few ideas for just such a thing.

Hot Ham & Cheese Party Rolls

Ingredients:

1 can refrigerated classic Pizza Crust 3/4 lb. deli ham (thinly sliced, but not

12 slices Swiss cheese (thinly sliced) Glaze:

½ cup (8 T.) butter

2 T. brown sugar

1 T. Worcestershire sauce

1 T. Dijon mustard

1 T. poppy seed

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Coat a 9x13" baking dish with cooking spray. 2. Unroll pizza dough onto cutting board and press into approximately a 13x18" rectangle. Top with ham and cheese slices. Starting on the longer side of the rectangle, roll up the edge tightly. When you reach the end, pinch the seam together and flip the roll so that the seam is face down. Cut into 12 slices, approximately 1 inch wide. Arrange in prepared dish face up.

3. Next combine the butter, brown sugar, Worcestershire sauce, mustard and poppy seeds in a sauce pan over medium heat. Whisk until the butter is melted and the glaze is smooth and combined. Pour evenly over the rolls.

4. Cover and refrigerate for up to 24 hours; or bake, uncovered for 25 minutes until golden and browned.

Etc. — Here's a cute idea for dipping veggies; place sliced veggies in a circle on a dish; place your dip in the center in a scooped out green pepper and/or red pepper; Another is Cucumber Cups: cut one English (seedless and peeled) cucumber, cut into 12 rounds (approx 1" thick slices), scoop out the inner flesh being careful not to scoop out the bottom and fill with your favorite tuna salad. ENJOY!

had his share of women, but only one true love – music and entertainment.

It was his passion that developed an ability to open up successful venues, mostly underground, one after another to support independent, up and coming artists in every category of music from early rock and roll, hippie grunge, RockaBilly to blues. With everything that transpired in the 50's, 60's, and 70's, Denny had his hand in it, filling up the clubs that others had turned their back on. He simply had a knack for it. Without ever being a musician himself, he had an ear, a love and appreciation for it that some are just born with.

Historic New Carlisle steps back in time to the

Imagine yourself at the Blue Lantern on a sultry Sunday evening in 1926, a warm breeze wafting through the building, the sun gleaming off the lake. You are dancing to some of the best jazz ever played.

The history of the Hudson Lake Casino (the historic Blue Lantern) goes back to its construction in 1914 by William and Avella Smith.

The Smith's had previously built a hotel which was located across the street from the casino in 1885, a general store, and a boat ramp. They were instrumental in popularizing Hudson Lake as a resort destination.

At the height of its popularity, Hudson Lake was a resort mecca complete with hotels, camping and picnic grounds, swimming, boating, fishing, dancing, and more. It became a popular place for large company picnics and family reunions.

After World War I, the Smith's brought in jazz bands for entertainment. There was no admission charge to the casino. The entertainment was paid for by selling dance tickets for 10 cents.

In 1925, the casino was enlarged and improvements made to the interior.

The summer of 1926 was a memorable one as the Casino was leased by the Smith's to Jean Goldkette of the Jean Goldkette Orchestra who renamed it the Blue Lantern and brought some of the most famous jazz musicians of the time to Hudson Lake.

Roaring 20's for the swankiest affair of the summer

Fred "Fuzzy" Farrar on trumpet, Irving "Itzey" Riskin on piano, and Frank Trumbauer on C melody sax, Bix Biederbecke on cornet, Sonny Lee on trombone, Pee Wee Russell on clarinet and sax, Dee Orr on drums, Dan Gaebe on bass, and Frank Diprima on banjo.

The group opened up for the Blue Lantern on May 22, 1926. Admission was \$1.50 and dance tickets were 10 cents. Sunday was the big day as train loads of people came out from Chicago and neighboring towns and cities to dance.

Some of the other bands to play at Hudson Lake included the Paul Whiteman Orchestra, Lola Trowbridge and the Indianans, and the Rag Pickers Five.

The music continued throughout the 1920s and early 30s. The casino felt the effects of the Depression and the music stopped.

The building is now used for special events and houses the popular Monroe's Crossing Restaurant which is operated by Rich and Leslie Monroe.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Opposition to the Hudson Lake Sewer Project

I read the article about wells and to hook up? I have over 3 acres. septic tanks and a sewer project for the Hudson Lake area in the May 6 issue of *The Gazette* ("Property Transfer Ordinance Goes into Effect").

I would like to supply an opposing view to a sewer project.

If there is a sewer project, we are told most residents will have to pay on average, \$5000 for hook up and to fill in our old septic tank. And that the monthly bill would be \$60.00.

And it's mandatory to hook up. Most Hudson Lake residents cannot afford this.

But it will be mandatory to hook up. The problem is not with the sewer project. The problem is the mandatory hook up clause.

Some of us have recently put in septic tanks. Or we have room for another tank and field. There is a clause in the proposed sewer project, but it entails checking every five years and mandatory hook up- eventually.

But what if we have room for another tank and field and don't want Maybe a clause is needed that,

if you have over a certain acreage, it's not mandatory hook up?

If any sewer project had a clause in it that made hook up voluntary, there would not be so much opposition to it.

Surely a clause or amendment could be given to the satisfaction of both sides, those wanting the sewer project and those that have no need and never want it.

As it stands, most of those I talk to are against it, because of the mandatory hook up clause.

A sewer project will additionally make our assessed values of our houses go up, and hence, our property taxes. We just had a tax hike with New Prairie Schools. We don't need another.

A sewer project for Hudson Lake will mean higher taxes.


