Now, this is a truly "peanutty" decadently dreamy dessert!

Creamy Peanut Butter Holiday Pie

Crust:

Dorothy Letterman's cookie crust (Dave's mom)

1 cup vanilla wafer cookie crumbs (low fat)

1/2 cup finely chopped pecans or walnuts

2 T. sugar

4 T. unsalted butter, melted

In a small bowl, combine ingredients. Spread over bottom and sides of a 9 inch pie pan and pat down firmly. Chill

Filling:

1 (8 oz) cream cheese (room temp) (I used 4 oz fat free)

1 c. creamy peanut butter (not natural)

1 cup confectioners sugar

1 1/2 cups heavy cream, chilled
1 tsp pure vanilla extract

In a medium bowl, beat cream cheese, peanut butter and confectioners sugar on medium speed until well-blended and smooth. Set aside.

In another medium bowl, beat whipped cream and vanilla extract on high speed until it holds firm peaks.

Add the whipped cream into the cream cheese mixture on low speed.

Pour the filling into the crust and smooth the top. Refrigerate for at least 3 hours or until set.

Spread either with Cool Whip or Whipped Cream that has been whipped and combined with 2 T. confectioners sugar.

Etc. — If you want to use a prepared graham cracker pie crust and save time, fine. Either way, you can sprinkle graham cracker crumbs over your topping. This is truly a time saver over the busy holiday days.

"I Don't Think God Is Good"

Many of us have heard this statement uttered from the mouths of people we know, "I don't think God is good!"

Recently a few weeks ago, I heard a friend I have known since college tell me this very thing. He questioned that God is good.

He went on to describe how he was wrestling with continual pain in his heart from a couple of major losses in his personal life.

As I listened to him, I prayed for God's love and wisdom to cover the remaining moments of our conversation.

He continued to unload the heartache inside of him that weighed heavy on his shoulders and affected many things in his personal life.

Underneath the pain, I could still sense that deep down my friend still did believe God is good but it was easier for him to be angry than it was for him to face his own heart.

I felt compassion for him as

we all have had, at least a few moments, when we doubt and question the truth about God in some way.

First, I encouraged him and helped him see the silver lining in some of the things that have come out positively from his trials and his losses.

Then, I looked at him and told him that he was not alone in wrestling with God, especially when it comes to the human struggle we all have to go face-to-face with the sadness and pain in our hearts.

I told him that it takes a lot of courage for us all to face what is in our hearts - especially as it relates to the unpleasant experiences we deal with - like loss, sadness, setbacks, heartaches and disappointments.

Doubting God's goodness is as old as Adam and Eve (Genesis chapter 3).

The serpent put that thought in Eve's mind when he suggested that it was God's fault for withholding the fruit from her because "God knows that when you eat from it, your eyes will be opened and you

will be like God knowing good and evil" (verse 5).

It was because of pride along with the deception from the enemy that Adam and Eve thought that they - rather than God - should determine what was good and best for their lives.

The Bible tells us that Satan even uses Scripture for his own evil ends by tempting the believer to doubt its truth.

When we experience doubts concerning the Word of God, we can follow our Lord's example and cite Scripture with confidence (Matthew 4).

Years after losing a daughter in death, James Bryan Smith found he was able to affirm God's goodness. In his book, "The Good and Beautiful God," Smith wrote that "God's goodness is not something I decide upon. I am a finite human being with limited understanding."

Smith's amazing comment isn't naive, it arises out of years of processing grief and seeking God's heart.

In times of discouragement,

let's listen well to each other and help each other see the truth that God is good!

We can see it in a similar fashion as the psalmist did and pray, "Lord, we praise You in our difficult times. You know us and You know what is best. We turn to You because we know You are good!"

Psalm 145:9 - "The LORD is good to all; He has compassion on all He has made."

Psalm 23:6 - "Surely Your goodness and unfailing love will follow me all the days of my life."

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New Carlisle kicks off Christmas season

Traditionally, the Sunday after Thanksgiving signals the start of Christmastime in New Carlisle.

On Sunday, November 26, the town welcomed the holiday season with the 23rd annual Christmas in New Carlisle celebration.

The event, which is organized by Discover New Carlisle, features a craft show at the fire station followed by the lighted parade downtown.

Those who attended the craft show had an opportunity to get a start on their holiday shopping, as vendors filled up the fire station with a variety of unique, home-made goods. The show was completely booked.

After dark, the parade began at Memorial Park and moved its way down Michigan Street, concluding in downtown.

This year's parade featured a record 37 entries, as various local businesses and organizations decorated their floats with Christmas lights.

As they have in the past, the United Methodist Church of New Carlisle pushed shopping carts down the route to collect items for the food pantry. The carts were provided by Groceries by Joe.

The finale of the parade was the arrival of Santa Claus, not on his sleigh, but rather upon a firetruck of the New Carlisle Volunteer Fire Department.

As Santa passed by the Town Hall, the town tree was lit up for the season once again. Following the parade, the community was treated to cookies and hot cocoa at the fire station to conclude the day's festivities.

Proceeds from the Christmas in New Carlisle celebration help keep the town decorated (and illuminated) during the holidays.

In addition to the lights on the downtown businesses and at Memorial Park, the lampposts along Michigan Street are adorned with wreaths and yarn Christmas "sweaters."

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New Household Hazardous Waste Site Now Open

St. Joseph County is home to a permanent Household Hazardous Waste collection facility which accepts various residential materials on a free drop-off basis.

The Solid Waste Management District's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Program has two main goals: to educate the public about household hazardous waste, and to make available safe and acceptable disposal options for household hazardous waste.

A new, and very improved, HHW site is now open at 828 Kerr Street in South Bend. Come say "hi" to Steve, Janice, and Ed. Normal operating hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30am to 4:00pm and 8:00am to 12:00pm on Saturdays.

The following materials will be accepted at the HHW facility:

- Aerosols (spray paint, insect sprays)
- Batteries (only Ni-Cad, Lithium, button cell and rechargeable batteries)
- Corrosives (lye, acids, drain killer)
- Mercury (elemental, thermostats, switches and relays, vapor lamps)
- Paints and solvents (paints, stains, finishing oils, thinners)
- Pesticides/Herbicides (weed and grass killer, insect killers, garden chemicals)
- Poisons (mouse and rat killers, roach and ant killers)
- Tires
- Waste Fuels (charcoal lighter,

- fuel oil, gasoline)
- Waste oils and lubricants (engine, gear, coolant)

The HHW facility also collects obsolete electronics such as the following: *arcade size video games, camcorders, desktop PCs and accessories, fax machines, pin-ball machines, power tools, scales (electronic), scanners, sewing machines, speakers, televisions, typewriters/word processors, video game consoles, adding machines, ballasts, calculators, cameras (film and digital), Game Boys, joy sticks/game controls, palm organizers, portable CD players, postage machines, radios, telephones answering machines, uninterrupted power supply.*

All electronics, paint, oil, pesticides, herbicides and lightbulbs are free to drop off during business hours.

Electronics from businesses or institutions will be accepted only through prior arrangement with the District.

There is also an excess recycling dumpster on site for public use.

The following materials will not be accepted at the HHW Center: appliances, building materials, medicines, gasoline powered engines, photo chemicals from business units, sharps (medical).

All St. Joseph County residents are entitled to use the HHW site. Any questions please call 574/235-9971.

New Carlisle is home to the largest overhand Wiffle Ball tournament in the nation. The Wiffle®Ball Championship is played annually during the Hometown Days festival.

in ball-shaped plastic containers he commandeered from a nearby Coty cosmetics manufacturer, and young David tested the designs.

Through trial and error, the Mullanys determined that a ball with eight oblong slots cut into one hemisphere worked best at grabbing the air and diverting the ball’s trajectory. The pitcher could easily throw a curve, a slider, or a knuckle ball.

Wiffle Ball players used a thin purpose-built Wiffle Ball bat, which further advantaged the pitcher by handicapping the batter.

The game, thus, produced a good number of strike-outs, called “Whiffs” in the Mullany’s neighborhood.

When Mullany began to supply local stores with the ball in 1953, he removed the “h” and trademarked the name “Wiffle.”

Neighborhood games of pickup

baseball required kids first to negotiate the roster, available space, and how to allow for safety considerations.

Wiffle Ball slowed the game, shrunk its field, and so helped in all three areas. But something else important is at work with Wiffle Ball’s success.

Before young pitcher’s arms lengthen and strengthen and before their wily skills sharpen, batters have the natural advantage. Minimizing the effects of size and skill, the goofy orb helped even the contest.

Headquartered in Shelton, Connecticut, Wiffle Ball, Inc. has produced millions of balls and established game rules and dimensions for field of play.

In the 60 years since its introduction, whole generations have begun their baseball careers swinging at a Wiffle Ball.
